From visiting museums to swimming lessons in the Olympic Park, there are a growing range of activities called '**learning destinations**'.

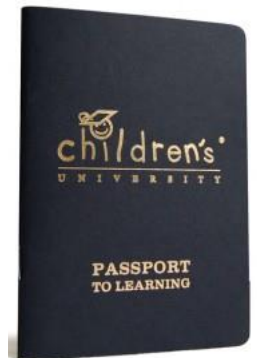
Why get involved?

Every student taking part in CU receives a '**Passport to Learning**'. Every time they take part in CU activity they will receive a stamp in their Passport.

Each stamp represents one hour of learning.

Recognising Participation and Achievement

Children's University celebrates achievement using **graduation ceremonies**. Certificates are awarded on the basis of hours of attendance so that they can be gained by all children irrespective of ability.

Graduation ceremonies will be held at a variety of venues including **University College London (UCL)**.

Students need to gain **30 hours of learning in order to achieve a Bronze Award** and be invited to a graduation. There are further benchmarks to aim for including a **Silver Award for 65 hours** and a **Gold Award for 100 hours**.
